ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT: STEVE HINDY '71



Steve Hindy '71

Steve Hindy graduated with a bachelor of science from the Cornell University School of Agriculture and Life Sciences in 1971, and a master of arts in teaching from the Arts and Sciences School in 1973. After spending five and a half years as a Middle East correspondent for the Associated Press, he returned to live in Brooklyn where he edited foreign news for Newsday. After brewing beer at home (he learned from envoys while in the Middle East—see below), he went on to co-found Brooklyn Brewery in 1988.

How did you go from covering wars in the Middle East to starting a brewery in Brooklyn, New York?

When I came to Cornell in 1967, I played on the golf team and

planned to design golf courses. (The most famous designer, Robert Trent Jones, is a Cornell grad.) Freshman year, my handicap was 2 but my GPA was 1.9, so I quit golf and ended up majoring in English, failed at teaching high school, and volunteered for a weekly in my hometown, *The Seneca Falls Reveille*. Two years later that led to a job with The AP and a post in Beirut, then embroiled in civil war. I had a crazy five and a half years, covering the hostage story in Tehran; the Iran-Iraq War; and wars in Lebanon, Syria, and Sudan. I was sitting behind Egyptian President Anwar Sadat when he was assassinated in 1981. I was abducted by a militia in south Lebanon in 1980 and two Irish UN peacekeepers who were with me were tortured and killed. (30 years later, I testified against the man who abducted us. He is now serving a life sentence in a military prison in Beirut. If you want to read the whole story, look at vice.com for "Between Beirut and a Hard Place.")

Oh, you asked me about The Brooklyn Brewery? Well, during my postings in Beirut and Cairo, I met American diplomats who had served in Saudi Arabia, the land of Islamic law where alcohol is forbidden. These envoys had become avid clandestine homebrewers while living in Jidda. I could not believe the quality of their homebrew. It was fantastic, and they made it in their kitchens!

I was happy in my life as a foreign correspondent. AP suggested my next posting might be Manilla because President Marcos was tottering. However, my second wife, Ellen Foote, who also is my first wife (and that is another story), objected. We had our first child, Sam, in crazy Beirut and the second, Lily, in chaotic Cairo. Ellen declared: "If you get transferred to Rome, we are with you, or maybe even Paris or London. But there is no way I am taking my babies to Manilla."

So ended my career as a dashing foreign correspondent. We returned to New York, settled in Brooklyn and I went to work for Newsday, which had nine foreign bureaus at that time. It was a great job, but I felt stifled being an editor; editing was for grownups. I started making beer at home. It was delicious! Everyone loved it! I read about these "microbreweries" opening around the country, mainly out West. I started dreaming of starting a brewery in Brooklyn, a town that had 48 breweries when it became part of New York City in 1898. Together with my neighbor, Tom Potter, a Yalie with a business degree from Columbia, we did a business plan and raised \$500K to get started. I convinced Milton Glaser, creator of the "I Love NY" logo and many other classic designs, to design a logo for us, and I found our angel investor, Jay Hall Jr., an entrepreneur from the tiny town where I grew up in Middleport, Ohio. I had no business degree, but I was confident I could sell a quality beer. As a young man, I won many sales contests selling candy for the boy scouts and selling greeting cards to win a chemistry set. I was "The Most Popular Newsboy in Ohio" in 1961, winning a two-week trip to Brazil along with winners from every other state. I was sponsored by *Family Weekly*, the magazine in many small newspapers. That was my resume. Brooklyn beers are now sold all over the world.

What advice would you share with others who want to start a business?

First of all, read my book, *Beer School*. Starting a new business is a drastic career change. It also can be dangerous in that you may be at the age where you have a family, children, and a mortgage. The stability you are enjoying with a big company is about to disappear. Starting a business requires every skill you have and many that you don't yet know you have. I never knew I could convince investors to put millions of dollars into my company. I never imagined a famous designer would become my closest friend and mentor. I never imagined that multi-national mega-breweries would one day offer millions to buy my company. You are entering the zone of entrepreneurial terror. Crazy days, sleepless nights. So I advise anyone starting a business to commit totally to the project and make sure your loved ones are with you. You will need them. Failure is not an option.

How has your experience with ΣAE influenced your life?

I was at Cornell during some very wild years: anti-war protests, building takeovers, black students with guns commandeering the Straight, protest-shortened school terms, pass-fail grades. It was a time of revolution, a time of testing and breaking rules. I recall many in my class rejected the hazing included in our initiation rite at ΣAE . Some of us left ΣAE over that. But the people I met at ΣAE , in my class and others, have become the best and oldest friends of my life. A unique bond was forged in those tumultuous years and those friendships mean a lot to me. I don't think I can recite all of "The True Gentleman," but believe it or not, I can sing, "Violet," and I know that Michael P. Smith hails from Riverside, Connecticut , and Bruce Wayne Clemens from St. Louis, and many others. And I am pleased to supply beer to ΣAE events for several years and support NY Alpha.

What is your favorite memory of ΣΑΕ?

My favorite memories of ΣAE are probably unprintable. Would I be allowed to plead the Fifth?

What advice would you give the young men restarting **SAE** at Cornell?

Things have changed greatly in the 55 years since I started at Cornell and joined ΣAE . I'm not sure I can relate to the world of the freshmen of 2022. But I hope they know that some great people have lived and studied and partied at Hillcrest, and they might want to enlist some of them in their programming.

HILLCREST FACILITIES UPDATE

We've begun work on the lower-level project (which will be named the Sieling Lounge). As of late September, the following progress has been made:

- Demolition is complete, including the removals of old plumbing and piping where possible
- Exterior work, including newly poured accessible concrete walkways, is nearly complete
- Interior doorways and windows have been expanded and modified
- New steel lintels have been installed
- Existing brick has been power washed; the bricks have a more consistent look now, despite their age, variation, and deterioration
- Electrical and plumbing rough-ins are substantially complete
- Framing is underway
- Flooring is anticipated to begin within the next few weeks
- Trim and finishes will follow the completion of flooring

Water damage under the stairs was expected, though its remediation was not included in the original bud-

get. Gutters have been cleaned, somewhat reducing water infiltration, but further work may be required.

New radiators have been ordered and are long-lead items. Cornell has agreed to heat the space with temporary heaters until the radiators arrive and are installed. Cornell has also agreed to restrict use of the renovated lower-level space. Current students living in Hillcrest will not have access. With the exception of the new radiators, which are expected after January '23, the project will be substantially complete this November according to the general contractor and the Cornell facilities team. This is an optimistic schedule, which is likely to be extended.

To date, the architect, the general contractor, and the Cornell facilities team have been responsive and motivated to get the work done expeditiously, on budget, and with high quality. Their coordination and following-through have been excellent.

The base bid for the project was accepted at \$463,300. The new base cost for the project is \$477,900. There is approximately \$20K remaining in the contingency fund. Some minor additional work has been done by the general contractor without charge.

Lee attended The Lawrenceville School and graduated from Rumson-Fair Haven High School and attended Cornell University '66 where he graduated magna cum laude in physics and economics. Lee was a member of the Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity. He briefly attended Harvard Law School, joining the Lincoln Inn Society.


Lee spent a stint in the marketing department at IBM in Poughkeepsie. During that time, he never missed a New England adventure including the weekend he spent at Woodstock. You can see him in the Woodstock documentary.

Lee loved adventure. After achieving a master's degree in city and regional planning at UC Berkeley, where he helped to design and establish a very successful commune in the heart of San Francisco, he decided it was time to travel the world on a sailboat. Growing up on the Shrewsbury River in New Jersey, Lee was an avid sailor. He circumnavigated the globe $1\frac{1}{2}$ times, followed by 10 years in Australia working at Prime Computer.

Coming back to the US, he moved to Oregon for 14 years and worked at Intel. There he quickly became part of the foundation of a fun-loving group of friends who embraced his adventurous, gregarious, and loving soul. Across more than the three decades that followed, the friends enjoyed many days of adventures on the slopes of Mts Hood and Bachelor and beyond, hiking trails throughout the Western US, and enjoying the water and snow sports around Hood River. Lee instantly became friends with everyone he met, and he met thousands of people around the globe, eager to learn and share in their interests. At Grateful Dead concerts he would create alliances with neighboring blankets, expanding his domain and love across the infield as the music played, just as he did outside the arena.

The luckiest of his friends spent time with Lee aboard the 47-foot Catana Catamaran that he sailed from 2005-2011, aptly named Worldwide Traveler. During those years he sailed up and down the Atlantic Coast, three years in the Mediterranean, all the way to Istanbul, back to the US, south through the Caribbean and to Honduras.
