DOUGLAS CROWE CU (ILR) '63

In my junior year at Cornell. I was privileged to room with Douglas Crowe '63 and Charles Rhodes '63 in an apartment in Lansing. Charlie was one of the smartest people I had ever met, and Doug was one of the most interesting. In those days, the engineering programs took five years to complete. Charlie stayed an extra year and was awarded two Bachelor's of Science degrees—one in mechanical engineering and one in electrical engineering. Doug managed to "bust out" at least once (possibly twice!) primarily due to his devotion to NY Alpha of ΣAE. He began in arts but later switched to ILR where he graduated. He then did his required service as an ROTC graduate in the Army and unfortunately gave his life in the Vietnam War.

This article is devoted to Doug's activities serving ΣAE .

Doug matriculated at Cornell in 1957 and was immediately drawn to fraternity life. At that time there were over 50 houses (there are now fewer than 30!) but in rushing the following spring he was most impressed with ΣAE and pledged

FUNDRAISING CHAIR'S LETTER

Thanks to all those who supported Cornell Giving Day this year. Over 44 donors contributed online, raising over \$28,000 for the Hillcrest Σ AE Development Fund. That does not include the \$45,000 matching gift by the class of 1969 in recognition of their 55th reunion. We are extremely grateful for all your support, and if you didn't participate, there's still time to give a suggested \$211 to the fund!

The Hillcrest Σ AE Development Fund is primarily used to fund renovations and capital improvements to Hillcrest. Because our house is university-owned, gifts are tax deductible and eligible for corporate matching. Since 2010, the fund has allowed us to renovate the new Sieling Lounge, a full room reconfiguration; repair the new wing roof; replace the window and deck replacements; and refurbish the kitchen (over \$1.725 million in total improvements).

Now that the house is again occupied, it is especially important to make your donations so that Hillcrest remains the bestlooking house on campus. As we are an emerging chapter, the house is still not completely full of brothers, making the support that much more important.

The other way to support NY Alpha is to pay your annual alumni dues. This fund allows the NY Alpha Alumni Association to maintain our website and alumni directory and all the wonderful digital improvements we have in the pipeline. We also use this fund for alumni events during reunion and other ways to get you back on campus enjoying the house.

there. He was initiated in the spring of 1958.

The fall of Doug's sophomore year, Cornell began excavation for what was to become Uris Library. At that time there was a kind of "mini gorge" between Hillcrest and Alpha Delt. At the time, the parking lot was about 20% of its current size. Doug noticed the daily caravan of dump trucks hauling material away to create the subfloors of the new library, and he made inquiries as to where they were taking the material. He was informed that they were taking the material down the hill, through the city of Ithaca, and finally dumping the debris on the west side of the lake. It was at least an hour's trek back and forth.

Doug contacted the construction company to see if they would be interested in dumping the fill in our "gorge," which was just five minutes from the Uris library site. The answer was an immediate "YES!" And so began the construction of the Hillcrest parking lot. Doug then worked with our resident "chef" Buster to provide coffee and donuts for the truck drivers. This was done so that they would dump the material in an orderly manner at Doug's direction. There may have been a charge for final grading, but

knowing Doug, I believe that he negotiated a "freebie" with the contractor as the contractor had saved so much money.

Unfortunately, this project began Doug's first trek toward "busting out," as he devoted more time to his unofficial role as Director of Dumping than to class!

As soon as Doug arrived back on campus (from his bust out) he began working on an addition to Hillcrest to accommodate what he perceived as a need for more bedrooms, a larger dining hall, and a kitchen on the same floor. Doug's tireless efforts in fundraising from individual alumni and the New York Alpha Association resulted in the west wing that now adorns Hillcrest. There is no doubt in my mind that without Doug's efforts, there would be no addition to Hillcrest.

In October of 1962, U-2 Spy Planes discovered that the Russians were installing missiles in Cuba, just 90 miles from the south coast of Florida. Finally, on October 22, 1962, President Kennedy called a news conference in which he declared that Cuba was to be blockaded



from any ships, Russian or not, that carried offensive weapons entering its waters. Doug Crowe was astute enough to ask the Eminent Archon to adjourn the regular Monday night chapter meeting so that we could listen to the president. Doug's sense of history meant that the actives of Σ AE witnessed that historic event. I, for one, will never forget it.

During the Christmas holiday of 1963, Doug called me at my home in Connecticut and asked if I would be willing to contribute \$200 which, with a \$200 contribution from him, would fund the purchase of an ice machine for the house. I agreed and ΣAE had its own ice machine, something no other house had! We charged the going rate for ice until our investment was returned, and then it was free ice for the house. (Hal Sieling did a similar thing a year earlier with a jukebox he obtained. We were charged a nickel a record until it was paid for and then Hal removed the coin box and we danced for free.)

In the spring of 1963, the ROTC program held a formal ball. Doug, by now one of the senior members of the Army program, came to me as eminent treasurer of the house to see if we could host a pre-ball dinner for the upper echelon. I talked with Fred Marks (House Steward) and "Chef Buster," and we decided to present the idea to the members. The brothers approved the idea and agreed to act as waiters. The centerpiece of the buffet dinner was a steamship roast. Chef Buster, dressed in white with the requisite chef's hat, carved perfectly roasted beef for the guests. The dinner was a resounding success, ΣAE received much praise, and we made a profit of around \$3,000 for the house!

Douglas Crowe was an amazing member of our fraternity and I often wonder what he would have gotten up to in his later life had he not been tragically lost during the Vietnam War. Phi Alpha, Doug, wherever you are.
